### Survey results are in!

Thank you to all who participated in the HCC survey. We received 15 surveys back in all which accounts to approximately 50% of our membership. The goal of the surveys was to gather member information to start a dialog so that the club can better serve the interest of all its members. We aim to create a dynamic and welcoming atmosphere for all members – new, old, beginner, intermediate or advanced.

A summary of the results:

- It was no surprise that members identified themselves as beginner, intermediate, advanced and a few professionals which is perfect for a club our size. We all benefit from having a diverse membership profile.
- Most members felt comfortable using their present camera.
- Photoshop and Photoshop Elements were the most widely used software with a few members also using Lightroom.
- Overwhelmingly, the consensus was to offer basic photography programs even though most considered themselves beyond beginner.
- Photography interests covered a wide array of interests: Macro, Landscapes, Action, Wildlife, Nature, Still Life, Street photography and concert photography.
- Suggestions include: workshops, field trips, outreach for more membership and presentations on special techniques.

The membership committee met on Saturday, November 7<sup>th</sup> to review the survey results and discuss next steps.

Go forward plan is to focus on the following (more details to follow):

- Create a pamphlet and flyer to promote membership
- ► Utilize social media to increase membership
- Workshops in March and May

Scheduled field trips with more focus on a specific topic and discussion and/or instructions around techniques.





## Shooting Fall Foliage by Dawn Dingee

Fall is one of the most beautiful times of year in the North East. From early September to late October, we are blessed with magnificent colors everywhere. One of my favorite subjects is the mirror-like reflections of the leaves in still water. Just a few tips for photographing fall foliage:

- 1. Take advantage of the variety of colors try getting pictures that have a wide range of hues and textures.
- 2. Take advantage of scattered leaves that can add beauty throughout an already beautiful landscape.
- 3. Take advantage of the **combination of water and foliage** whether it be fog among the trees, reflections in the water or leaves in a stream.
- 4. Take advantage of the cold, crisp mornings **frost** on the leaves can be beautiful.
- 5. Take advantage of the **light on the leaves** leaves still on the tree, leaves on the ground, or leaves floating in a stream the light reflecting off the warm tones can be breathtaking.
- 6. Don't' be afraid to try black and white.

### Concert Photography by Rick Pauline

First question; what's the easiest part of concert photography.

#### Answer; nothing!!!

From gaining access to the venue, to getting permission to shoot, to shooting unobtrusively, it's a struggle from the word "go". To begin with, the shooting conditions are nightmarish. More than likely, your subject(s) will be constantly moving, making them a literal moving target and lighting is constantly changing from total darkness to bright lights to somewhere in between...but not for too long...



#### *Rules of the game*

Ask permission (from the artist and/or the venue). (When that fails, shoot anyway and the ask forgiveness!).

Secure the proper credentials, and if possible, chat with the security personnel before the show begins to let them know you'll be around.

▶ BE PREPARED!!! Have your gear ready to go, which means having several charged batteries and more than one formatted memory card.

► Know the venue. How close will you be able to get to the artist? Some places will allow you to approach the stage, others will not, so plan your equipment accordingly (i.e., long lens, medium telephoto, etc.)

► Shoot courteously. Try not to stay in the same place for more than a minute or so and do not block anyone's view!

► Do not shoot during quiet passages.

► Turn off the flash!!! Many artists do not object to being photographed, but no artist wants the flash going off in their eyes. Also, it disturbs the audience.

▶ Dim or turn off the LCD screen so as to interfere with the viewers sitting behind you.







### Technical Tips

- ► If you shoot RAW, white balance is not an issue as it can be corrected in Post.
- Shoot as fast as you can.

Since your subject will be moving, use the fastest shutter speed you can get away with.

- ► Use the highest ISO that will yield acceptable results.
- Use fast lenses (i.e., f2.8 when possible).

► Keep your fingers on the controls and be prepared to adjust shutter speed on the fly (as lighting changes).

BIEFOIRIE After the shoot:

- Send thanks to the venue and to the artist.
- ► Offer some of your work to both for them to use for promo purposes.

► Set aside a lot of time for post-processing. You are likely going to come away with many images. I typically have 300+ RAW files

### Member Profile – Bill DeVoti

This story begins in 1924 when great uncle Abbott purchased an 18th century at-one-time stagecoach inn, in Sheffield, from two American Indians burning it down from the insides to keep warm. We logged some of the trees on the corner of that property and built our home here in the early 1970's. Actually the story might go back to about 1900 when my grandparents, who raised me years later, migrated to America from Italy. This accounts for my love of the mellifluous Italian language, some of which I still understand though very little of which I can reproduce; which also accounts for our almost annual visit to different areas of Italy since 1985 when we finished paying college tuitions for our third and last child. Also, in the 90's I received an NDEA grant to study the early Italian Renaissance, in Italy, for six weeks with 14 other teachers, led by a master teacher. So Italy as well as the U.S. account for many of my photographs, though my wife and I have visited other countries since 1985, including the ex-USSR, Egypt, and much of central and Eastern Europe. Also my poetry has been recorded in the archives of the U.S. Library of Congress, and I am working on a volume of new and collected poems.

I've always had an interest in photography. In the military in the 50's I spent a lot of time in hobby photo labs and travelled with the 69th fighter/bomber squadron up and down the Asia Pacific rim. So I was deep into black and white photography and later, color slides and prints. Brian Wilcox and I were usually the two highest scorers in the club competitions (before Lazlo and Bert). I was president of the club for four years (and Brian was my vice president for two). Being one of the last members of the "old club" to convert to digital, I now love the ease of taking digital photographs, but lag behind in processing them on my Mac desktop. No complaints! The club has come a long way with digital photography and there is no road back! Another longtime member of the club, the innovative Lazlo Gyorsok, introduced us to the Sony (they took over and improved Minolta) NEX mirrorless DSLR line of cameras. Although I have a Sony full-frame DSLR, I much prefer my lightweight Sony mirrorless, 24.3mp, ax6000 with an 18-55mm lens and a thin 16mm wide angle lens in my pocket. On a rare occasion I'll use some of my older lenses with an adapter, like a Sony 27-300mm zoom.

My main contribution to the club since I retired as president is, along with Ann Wilkinson, organizing and executing our annual print show at Noble Horizons (next opening reception January 15, 2016) which, since last year, moves on to Geer Village and eventually Millbrook Public Library. I also bug people to contribute to our "Member Profile" library which I edit for our award winning newsletter. I have asked many of you to expose yourself to that, but the slate is open as of the moment, which is why I'm covering myself just before the deadline for the November issue.
